Dr. Sean J. McCarthy is an accomplished and dedicated school educator and leader with over two decades of experience. He operates under the principle that relationships are essential for success. With this cornerstone belief, Sean prides himself on being visible, accessible, and approachable. Not one to sit in his office, Sean frequently visits classrooms and offices, informally checking in with the members of his school community. Seeing people in different settings allows him to better understand and connect with each individual – a meaningful and intentional component of his role. Sean has an open-door policy, not only in letter, but in spirit. He knows that little will be accomplished if not everyone feels comfortable and safe to share their thoughts. Sean is willing to engage in conversation with all members of a school – from families and students to campus adults to the Board or district leadership. He recognizes that running a school requires consistent and direct communication and his ability to listen has been a welcome trait in each of his professional roles.

Sean has had the good fortune to experience the field of education from multiple positions and perspectives: as a student, teacher, coach, advisor, mentor, Union official, assistant principal, principal, and parent. In every instance, the previous role has informed and deepened his understanding and success in the subsequent one. Most recently, Sean served as Interim Head of School at a charter school in Salem, MA, as the educational and instructional leader for 350 students in grades K through 5 and 50 faculty and staff.
